Things like a quilt made from worn-out clothing, every square telling a story—like my husband's flannel shirt that was his favorite gardening companion until it was nearly threadbare, or an old worn-out pair of jeans once worn by my boys, where the size of the little pocket reminds me of how tiny they all once were. There are my garden boxes that we built from the wood ripped from my friends' home during a recent remodel, some of the boxes filled with wildflower seed from fellow Farmgirl Maven Deere Dawn and the Papa Ott's morning-glory seeds from farmgirl Kelly that beckon me to think of the Mavens every time I walk by. More recently, it is my newly finished chicken coop that we constructed using some of the old barn wood from my in-laws' old barn, with memories in each plank. And if truth be told, I would choose an old home over a new one any day of the week, as I love the stories that I imagine are there, their roots firmly intact in my mind and their history in my care. I love that it all has a past. It has touched the hands and the hearts of those that I love and that love me—visual proof, perhaps, that we are all connected in so many tangible ways.



Even now, I can't come up with a satisfactory explanation for my love of softly used things. I guess it is just a part of me, that part of me that loves to recycle, reuse, and revive—the giving back of life to potentially forgotten items or finding new life for old things once thought used up. I think it is the part of me that those who love me secretly love the most. I have a plaque that defines my name as meaning "reborn," so maybe I have it right ... It is just a part of who I am.

Here in Missouri, you can't get any more farmgirl than Laura Ingalls Wilder's home in Mansfield. It is a four-hour drive from St. Louis or three hours from Kansas City, and well worth the trip. Not only do you get to tour her main house (the kitchen is absolutely fascinating), but also that of the rock house (built for her and her husband by their daughter for their "old age"). The museum features many of Laura's possessions, like her sewing (she was quite good with a needle) and her cookbook put together with leftover pages of her husband's business books. There are several family items from her mother and in-laws. There are also many items belonging to Rose Wilder Lane, who is an absolute farmgirl in her own right (she would not accept a ration book during WWII because she believed every good American should be able to grow most of their own food—and she did! She was retirement age during the war). The gift shop has lots of neat items such as kits for putting together rag dolls and other children's toys and copies of writings by both Laura (besides the Little House books, she also wrote a column for the local paper from a farmwife point of view) and her daughter, Rose. Neatest things I found were little glueable book-owner slips with Laura's picture and signature. Very cool place, cheap to get in, and lots of opportunity to get some exercise (Missouri hills!). This is only one of the many very cool farmgirl places that is fun to visit, and maybe being featured in MJ books would give them the much-needed press they need to stay open during these times of economic strain felt by nonprofits like this *Little House* reservation.

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Keeping in Touch  $\sim$  Saving the Heritage Chicken continues  $\dots$  Endangered Livestock Breeds

A list of endangered livestock breeds can be found at **www.albc-usa.org**. That's the American Livestock Breeds Conservancy, and they provide a great newsletter to members. It's worth joining even if you don't raise livestock.

We raise heritage Golden Laced Wyandotte chickens. They were originally bred in our area (WI), and they are super hardy for our climate. They are fantastic parents, great layers, and have very flavorful meat. They are gentle and beautiful. We are doing our best to preserve this national treasure. We have people request our eggs ALL the time, because of the difference in quality, size, and flavor (of course, the chickens are fed organic feed, so that helps)! The roosters are quite docile as well. We could not be more pleased.

We also have a few Black Australorps, which carry the Orpington genes, and they are lovely, too ... but our breeding focus is on the Wyandottes.

If everyone who kept chickens could make room for at least a few rare heritage breeds, what an awesome effort would be made in preserving them. We get our stock from **www.mcmurrayhatchery.com** and have always received super-healthy chicks. GOOD LUCK!

Even though we don't breed anything other than chickens, we support breeders of heritage livestock with our "additions," and thereby maintain a heritage farm and try to raise awareness of breed diversity. Our pride and joy is our Mammoth Jackstock jennet (huge donkey), Tikki, as well as our Jacob sheep. We love it when passers-by slam on their brakes to look at our four-horned, spotted sheep, and the giant "horse" with the foot-long ears!




### kale for the third) 1/2 c juice (or cooking liquid from vegetables) egg, slightly beaten

In a small bowl, mix all ingredients until well combined.

Preheat oven to 425°F. Lightly oil a corn-shaped cornbread pan or muffin tin or use paper liners. Combine dry ingredients in a medium bowl. Cut in butter with a pastry blender. Combine vegetables, juice or cooking liquid, and egg. Stir into dry ingredients until just combined. Pour into pan or tin, filling 2/3 full. Bake for 25 minutes, until tops begin to brown.
