
### Pay Dirt Farm School Classes

Pay Dirt Farm School is our non-profit educational program offering farm apprenticeships and classes in farming and gardening, stitching, crafting, cooking, and more. The program provides practical experience for individuals who value common sense and introduces them to the operations of an organic farm. The school's mission is to cultivate organic farmers and eaters. The school was founded with the belief that the elimination of deadly pesticides, herbicides, and chemical fertilizers, along with the maintenance of healthy living soil and the rebuilding of local communities, all play a major role in the development of individuals whose thoughts, dreams and actions create positive change. Pay Dirt classes are now being offered at both the Coeur d'Alene store and the Moscow store, as well as at the farm.

PNW Wheat Harvest Begins, posted by Amy Warwick My husband is a wheat farmer in the extreme part of eastern Washington. We farm 2,700 acres of wheat, barely, lentils, and peas. He does this all with the assistance of one hired hand and parttime help from his father and me. My husband has often commented about how much he misses the days of old when the women cooked and brought meals to the field and everyone took a couple of hours off to sup together. Since I have five kids and a job of my own, he has never expected that of me. So, this year, I surprised him by taking time off from my normal job to be the real-deal old-fashioned farm wife for harvest. I will drive truck part-time, go on parts runs, flag the combines, cook all of the meals, make the crew lunches, and on Sundays (only) I will even take hot meals of fried chicken or pulled pork sandwiches, mashed potatoes, corn on the cob, pie, and iced tea or cold lemonade to the field where my five children and I will set up "dinner" for the whole crew. Since I won't be able to work outside of the farm, I thought I would blog about my farm wife experiences for anyone interested in the trials and tribulations of life on a northwest wheat farm. We started last night by flagging three combines out to our pea field, and first off I missed the most fantastic pictures. My husband cut into the field as the lead combine with the other two following suit, and then they all stopped to step out on the deck of the combine. On deck number 1 was my husband and 11-year-old son, on deck 2 was my hired man and my 4-year-old son, and directly behind them on deck 3 was my father-in-law and my daughter all standing colorfully in a row. They were all staring at the job ahead of them with excitement and unity, clapping and overjoyed that we were finally in the field. ### MaryJane's Sunrise Pink ChillOver

- 2 12-oz bottles of Izze Sparkling Grapefruit Juice
- ½ cup sugar
- 1 packet ChillOver Powder

Blend together 1 bottle of grapefruit drink and the sugar and bring to a boil. Reduce heat to medium, sprinkle and stir ChillOver Powder into liquid, and cook for 3 minutes, stirring frequently. Remove from heat.

Stir in second bottle of grapefruit drink. Pour into a serving dish and chill until firm, about 2 hours. Garnish as desired.

Yield: 6 servings
